# <u>District I Annual Meeting – March 1, 2023</u> <u>Director's Report</u>

District I was sad to see one of our constituent clubs, Greenfingers GC of Cecil County, leave our fold this past December. They are in a very rural area with a small, aging population which made it very difficult to recruit and retain members. They were, however, a great group who were always engaged with

our district. They just couldn't sustain themselves. Their members were encouraged to find other District I clubs to join.

Two separate donations for the Penny Pines Program were sent in after the collection of donations at the October Semi-annual Meeting. These funds were designated for the planting of trees in Florida after the devastation of Hurricane Ian.

District I clubs *all* participated in Governor and Mrs. Hogan's Statehouse Christmas Display this past December. The trees and wreaths were stunning and remarkably reflective of all the interesting counties on the Eastern Shore. Thank you all who volunteered for this activity.



Finances are often barriers to activities for a number of our clubs. I'd like to remind everyone that a number of grants are available to support your projects, specifically civic beautification, historic preservation and flower shows. Go to the FGCMD website for more information. Oxford GC recently was selected to receive a \$1000 grant from the NGC Plant America program. Other district recipients of this grant have included Dorchester and Chestertown GC. Clubs undertaking flower shows in District I are very fortunate to have access to the Dottie Howatt Grant Fund, also \$1000, to help underwrite flower show expenses. Somerset GC has received this funding for their July Herb Show. Recently announced is a source of funding—the FGCMD Mae Scott Food Bank Donations award. These are monies to be awarded for contributions of food grown by an individual club and donated to a local food bank or for a club working with a community garden

which donates to food banks. This could be something new to consider for your youth gardening or, perhaps, garden therapy activities.

All our clubs are preparing new programs for the 2023-2024 year, yearbooks are being produced and new administrations are poised to step into their responsibilities. It is an exciting time. Exciting for me too as I have concluded my two year term and look forward to stepping back in a supportive role and spending more quality time in my garden. I very much appreciate the honor of leading this amazing district. I have made many friends, learned a lot and continue to be amazed by how much we accomplish and the level of excellence we consistently achieve. We have held four top notch district meetings with engaging programs and great participation. We held an incredible flower show last September which employed some very successful new strategies for fundraising, attracting visitors and educating members and the public. I believe our communications, while sometimes voluminous, with district members, including an excellent monthly newsletter, Garden Basket, kept everyone informed and afforded opportunities to participate in many statewide events.

# Marguerite Willey Bowl Award - 2023

Presented by Jeanne Bernard, District Director

"It is my privilege to present this year's Marquerite Willey Bowl Award. This award is given annually to the club which has best served the District in promoting one of the State or National objectives of the Federated Garden Clubs of Maryland, Inc.

The award's namesake, Marquerite Willey, was President of Somerset County Garden Club from 1969-1970. She emphasized Community Service and Garden Therapy by setting an example for other garden club members. Her special interest was daffodils, and thus the bowl is always presented filled with these lovely spring blooms.

This year's award winner is a vibrant, highly engaged club whose activities have been particularly emblematic of the priorities embraced by Marguerite Willey. As I outline why this club was selected, it will be impossible to keep the winner a surprise. This club, which has been around for over a century now and whose membership is the largest of most clubs in the State of Maryland, is committed to serving their community in many important ways. First, they educate their members and the public at large by regularly offering the highest quality programs and activities. They, every year, sponsor a Winter Lecture series, open to all, presenting timely topics and quality speakers. This Spring they are hosting an exciting and elegant luncheon and garden symposium featuring

exceptional presenters. They alternate this program every other year with the Maryland Home and Garden Pilgrimage which is a huge undertaking and open the most beautiful properties for the touring public.

This club prioritizes civic beautification regularly designing, funding, and maintaining multiple gardens throughout their county—the Historical Society, the Free Library, the Gardens at 5 Corners at Idlewild Park and the Frances Plate Memorial Children's Garden in this same park. Through their new Project Grants Committee, they will soon design, fund and plant a new garden as requested by the local Post Office. Outside of their regular civic beautification projects, they recently approached their County about providing flowering trees, benches and periodic garden oases along the pathways of the Rails to Trails Project. The Rails to Trails Conservancy is a national, non-profit organization based in Washington DC whose mission it is to build a nation connected by trails. They seek to reimagine public spaces to create safe ways for everyone to walk, bike and be active outdoors. Planting trees and providing the opportunity for the community to connect with nature is a perfect garden club contribution.

During the past several years when it has been difficult to safely serve vulnerable populations, this club has maintained an active Community Garden Therapy program. On a regular basis, particularly for holidays, garden club members convene to create arrangements for patients at the Hospice House as well as for clients of the Interfaith Shelter.

Finally, this club has a very engaging Young Gardeners program whereby, monthly at the Public Library, they teach students up to age ten from public, private and home-schooling environments. As an example, the children have planted bulbs in the library garden and have helped create a book on gardening.

I am sure Marguerite Willey would be pleased with our Director's selection of this year's award recipient. It is my great honor to present this award to the Talbot County Garden Club for the breadth and scope of incredible work they do. I would like to invite incoming President, Maribeth Lane, representing current President Carolyn Rugg, to come forward to accept this bowl of daffodils, with the congratulations of all of District I for a job well done".
