FGCMD News.....Susie Middleton, FGCMD State President Installation Speech – March 28, 2023

So now that I'm here - what can you expect from me?

To introduce the theme and project for my term you need to know that I grew up as a savage tomboy. Savage because I was known to practice my Tarzan yell swinging from vines – this didn't work too well in the Maryland woods.

I was also a diehard collector. At one time I had 23 box turtles, 104 white mice, 2 guinea pigs, 2 dogs, a cat, countless tadpoles, and frogs. Also worms because my grandfather taught me how to create a worm farm for fishing.

We lived in a neighborhood surrounded by a native forest and streams. I spent endless hours roaming those woods. Over the years I came to learn the patterns of growth, first came the May Apples, followed by jack-in-the-pulpits, native ferns, and dogwoods. Oddly enough I didn't collect these – even then I knew they were better left alone.

If like me, you were fortunate enough to grow up at that time you remember warm summer evenings when the lawns were filled with lightning bugs. Remember how we would capture them to put in grass-filled jars with holes punched in the lids and then release them the next morning?



It was these memories that made me realize how much has changed. **Think of it**.... when was the last time you saw a lightning bug, heard peeper frogs, or saw a Baltimore Oriole? Too many of our native birds, and insects have all but disappeared. And this is happening at an alarming rate.

How bad is it?

- Take the birds. North America has three billion fewer birds today compared to 1970 (let me remind you that a billion is 1,000 million)—that means more than 1 in 4 birds have disappeared from the landscape in 50 years. That is in your lifetime.
- But birds aren't alone, a new study finds frogs, toads, and salamanders also disappearing at an alarming rate.
- Some people are looking at the fate of native bees and the stats are not good.
- The Bumblebee species has declined by 96%. Declining 96%? Of course, you could say "well there are still some left". But if it was your bank account that declined 96%, wouldn't you be concerned? At 96% they are so rare that they are no longer performing in their eco-system. So, they are functionally extinct even if you can still find some.
- These are just part of a global trend.

The tragedy is that we did it – we collectively, with our landscaping and development practices. We have cut down the native forests and fields and replaced them with invasives, non-native plants, pavement, and lawns, in doing so we destroyed their habitat. We have also polluted our waterways with erosion, chemical runoff, sewage, and plastics.

So, what can we do?

Albert Einstein once said, "Insanity is continuing to do the same thing but expecting different results."

So, the answer is simply that we need to change what we are doing, in our homes, clubs, and communities. Each one of us choosing to change one thing can make a difference. So, that is the purpose of my President's project. It is called "Sustaining Maryland...one action at a time." I'm going to ask each of you to think of something you can do differently: reduce your use of plastic, car-pool, begin recycling, leave the leaves to overwinter, conserve, and plant more trees and native plants. There is an endless list of things you can do – please just start with one. But my project is to also encourage this on a larger scale, your donations to the President's Project will be used to fund grants to garden clubs that want to implement programs to benefit the environment. Grants will be given twice a year. The deadlines are August 31st (Awarded October) and February 28th (Awarded March).

So, join me in this Journey- Working together we can make a difference and create a better world to leave for the next generation.
